

Over the years, serving as the chapter's Scholarship chair has sometimes been a bit like participating in a mini drama, as we become familiar with each successful applicant's background, their aspirations and the outcome of their efforts. Most have excellent outcomes because of their preparations and pursuits. We have sent many students to the service academies and to upper tier universities over the years, but I believe that is the first time in over ten years that our chapter has sent a student to Harvard College - especially to enter the Marine Option program with the NROTC unit.

Anjali Ghafoerkhan is that student. I met her when she came to Richard E. Byrd Library in Springfield to interview for a scholarship grant. She had been accepted by the NROTC Unit at the University of Virginia, but Harvard College had wait-listed her. Anjali

acknowledged UVA's reputation, but felt that a position in the NROTC Unit at Harvard was worth fighting for. About the time that she graduated from Gar-Field High School, Anjali was notified that she had been accepted by Harvard! On the way, Anjali did basic naval orientation at Great Lakes Illinois Naval Training Center after graduating from high school. She was about to become part of the contingent of three new Marine Option midshipmen. She advised that they are the first Marine Option students at Harvard in five years! She quipped: "The few. The proud..."

She says "Life at Harvard has been challenging, but I am adapting well to it. I have been greatly enjoying the Marine Option specific training (thus far including an introduction to land navigation, weapon safety and hiking). I think favorite part has been the bonds I have formed with my fellow mv midshipmen. They've made every crazy early morning tolerable and given me things to laugh about, regardless of whatever stress or exhaustion I am dealing with."

Final Thoughts:





Virginia Veterans Eligible for the Virginia Military Survivors Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP) Receive a Scare this Past Summer!

With the long summer now behind us, I am getting caught up on some of the legislative news and updates affecting local veterans. Couple this with my own recent

retirement from the Air Force, I was interested in researching benefits that directly impact our retirees and eligible veterans.

I was shocked to read about Virginia's efforts to repeal certain educational benefits for qualifying veterans and retirees. The VMSDEP is a Commonwealth of Virginia program that provides education benefits to spouses and children of qualifying veterans who have been rated by the VA as totally and permanently disabled or, receive at least a 90 percent disability rating. Specifically, if you qualify, the VMSDEP would cover up to 8 academic semesters at a Virginia public college and university. VMSDEP is one of only a few statemandated tuition waiver programs, which means VA schools are required to waive tuition for prospective students who meet all eligibility requirements.

Over the years, there has been an increase in the number of retirees and veterans who receive a 90 percent or higher VA rating, leading to increased financial burdens on state schools. According to the State Council of Higher Education, during the 2022-23 school year, total waivers topped over \$65 million with eligible students topping 6,000, up from about 1,000 a decade prior. As result, the state budget proposed cuts on May 13, 2024, which would have required students' income to be factored into future decisions about tuition waivers. This would have meant significant education benefits being covered by the VMSDEP.

Virginia HB 6004 and SB 6012, signed into law by Governor Youngkin in July of 2024, repealed this change. The law now invests an additional \$90 million from a general fund surplus over the biennium — atop a prior \$40 million allocation — to fully cover the cost of the program. This is a huge victory for thousands of prospective Virginia high school children who counted on the program for their future education!




