Army Reached Record Recruitment Number. From the Association of United States Army: *The Army is adding 10 basic training units at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, and Fort Sill, Oklahoma. The move comes after the Army invested in several programs and incentives to reverse a recruiting slump, exceeding its goals in fiscal 2024 after missing them two years in a row. In fiscal 2024, the Army recruited 55,000 new soldiers and put 11,000 in its delayed entry program.*



Summary of MOAA's Legislative Priorities for the 119th Congress

Currently Serving: Recent Government Accountability Office (GAO) report reveals the myriad challenges servicemembers in unaccompanied housing are facing. The health, safety, and privacy concerns outlined by GAO show the need for action. MOAA seeks to improve funding and condition transparency for unaccompanied housing by requiring an annual, publicly available report, which will highlight areas that require the most attention from both DoD and Congress.

Retirees/Veterans: MOAA will focus on capitalizing on our recently released report, <u>Ending the Wait for Toxic-Exposed</u> <u>Veterans</u>, to advocate for veterans exposed to toxic materials during their service. While the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act has made major improvements to how toxic exposures are treated by the VA, additional measures are required. In cooperation with other VSOs, MOAA will advocate for Congress to pass legislation that shortens the time veterans must wait before their toxic exposures are acknowledged and conceded by the VA.

Family/Survivors: Rate of unemployment for military spouses is four to five times higher than the national average. This persistent challenge requires not only providing education and employment resources for spouses, but also incentivizing businesses to hire someone who will likely move in two to three years. The Work Opportunity Tax Credit program was established to support populations who face significant barriers to employment, and adding a military spouse target group is long overdue. Passing the Military Spouse Hiring Act will provide another important lever needed to address the critical issue of spouse unemployment.

DoD Health Care: DoD has acknowledged that congressionally directed reforms to the Military Health System (MHS), together with U.S. medical workforce volatility, exacerbated long-standing access challenges and led to a destabilized MHS that does not consistently deliver timely care to beneficiaries. MOAA is seeking a digital MHS assistance platform allowing beneficiaries to report access-to-care challenges and receive help navigating the MHS.

VA Health Care: MOAA has long advocated for legislation that would improve caregiving support for veterans' families. This includes enhancements to the VA Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) and expansion of home health and long-term care services to meet current and future needs of veterans, their caregivers, and families. MOAA strongly supports the reintroduction and enactment of the Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement Act. By offering education, employment, and retirement opportunities, the legislation empowers caregivers to achieve financial security while potentially reducing the federal government's long-term economic burden.

Persistent Efforts. Issues that MOAA will always advocate until passed are concurrent receipt for combat wounded (Major Richard Star Act), Arlington National Cemetery access, and cost-of-living adjustments (COLAs). Other issues under constant watch by MOAA are: Decrements to scheduled pay increases, New TRICARE or TRICARE Pharmacy Program fees, TRICARE cost-sharing increases that exceed military retired pay COLA or TRICARE Pharmacy Program cost sharing that exceeds common industry practice, Unequal decrements of compensation and benefits based on rank, age, family composition, retirement status, or disability benefits.

Through our efforts, MOAA will seek to ensure that servicemembers, veterans, and retirees and their families — who have sacrificed so much — continue to receive benefits earned through their service

Virginia General Assembly

CDR John Prevar, USN (Ret)), VCOC

The Joint Leadership Council of Veterans Service Organizationa, of which the MOAA Virginina Council of Chapters (VCOC) is a member, submitted five initiatives. The status of each is listed below:

JLC Initiative 2025-01: Verification of Veteran Status – Arrest and Jaila

Objective: To identify arrested and incarcerated veterans in Virginia so to better connect them to U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs (USDVA), Virginia Department of Veterans Services, and community employment, education, and other resources to help lower their recidivism rate and connect them with federal

Status: House Bill 2071, which incorporated House Bill 2522 and was merged with Senate Bill 1251: **Passed.**

JLC Initiative 2025-02: Stop Unscrulous Firms from Exploiting Veterans

Objective: Prohibit "Claim Shark" companies from preying on veterans seeking to obtain or modufy their VA entitlements.

Status: House Bill 1911, House Bill 2112, Senate Bill 1222, and Senate Bill 1226: Failed.

JLC Initiative 2025-03: Virgina National Guard Tuition

Objective: Transition the Virginia National Guard State Tuition Assitance Program (STAP) from its current reimbursement model back to an upfront payment model.

Status: House Bill 1595 merged with Senate Bill 118: Passed.

JLC Initiative 2025-04: Suffolk State Veterans Cemetary Expansion

Objective: Secure the necessary funds to expand the Albert G. Horton, Jr. Memorial Veterans Cemetary in Suffolk, ensuring that it cintinues to meet the needs of our veterans and their families.

Status: House Bill 1600, Item C-52.20: **Passed.** Senate Bill 800, Item C52.20: **Failed.** These are included in the House and Senate budget bills, which are currently in conference.


JLC Intiative 2025-05: Women Veterans Day

Objective: To establish June 17th as Women Veterans Day in Virginia, recognizing the contributions and sacrifices of womwn veterans and commemorating the historic signing of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act: **Referred to Committee on Rules.**
